The Southwest Group: Preserving and Celebrating Downtown

In anticipation of National Preservation Month, the Southwest Group and Place de Lafayette will be shining a light on their efforts of preserving and rejuvenating Downtown’s older buildings throughout the years with a celebration in May. A look at past and current projects showcases their accomplishments, which have had a great impact on the district.

One of the company’s most recent triumphs is the transformation of the Tribune Building in the 100 block of East Vermilion Street. Formerly occupied by the Tribune Printing

Plant, the building now houses a unique trio of businesses including Philippe’s Wine Cellar, Recycled Cycles of Acadiana and The French Press. The Southwest Group is also looking to the future as they work with owners of other buildings and are putting the finishing touches on the new men’s salon, Refinery and begin work on The Lofts this summer located on South Buchanan Street.

Their work began in 1997 with the transformation of the Poche Building at 201 West Vermilion Street from the Dixie Office

Supply building into functional office space, which currently houses Heart of Hospice and several other companies. As the Southwest Group grew, they gained momentum in 2008 with the renovation of the Cal Chlor Building at 625 Jefferson Street and the Southwest Group Building at 201 West Vermilion, which was formerly occupied by Bell Telephone Company. Recently renovated, the third floor of the Southwest Group Building is available to be leased for office space.

“The Southwest Group and Place de Lafayette appreciates our clients, partners, families, employees and neighbors for joining us in preserving downtown. Without them and the entities of the DDA, LEDA, and the Preservation Alliance, downtown Lafayette would not be in the great state that it is in now. We are looking forward to seeing Downtown Lafayette continue to move in a positive direction,” said Southwest Group spokesman Danny Nugjer.

Downtown Joins Louisiana Cultural Districts



Downtown Lafayette is very pleased to announce that the district has been approved by the State Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism for designation as a Louisiana Cultural Products District. Beginning March 1st, original works of art including visual arts and crafts sold in the district will be exempt from the state sales tax of 4%. In addition, this designation expands tax credits for the rehabilitation of historic structures

and properties located within cultural products districts. To celebrate Downtown joining other cultural districts in Louisiana, state and local officials, art sellers in the district and art lovers across Acadiana are invited to the official launch on March 13th during 2nd Saturday ArtWalk. As ArtWalk festivities take place, horse drawn carriage rides will stroll through Downtown beginning at Parc Sans Souci. For details, visit www.DowntownLafayette.org.

The second phase of Parc de Lafayette refurbishment is now complete. The project to revive the parc, which connects the city parking garage to Jefferson Street, began last year as community volunteers, the Louisiana Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects and Keller-Williams, teamed up with the City and Downtown Lafayette to introduce a new color palette and plantings to the parc. The second phase recently completed included the re-planting of the parc's landscape, refurbishment of the fountain, and a new irrigation system donated by Olivier's Sprinklers and Drainage. Dining Alfresco - Pick your spot Downtown

Although the unusually cold weather has kept many indoors, spring is near and the time for an outdoor dining experience is a must. Whether you are looking for something light and quick or a long, luxurious meal, Downtown restaurants have a gastronomic experience for any taste as you kick back and soak in the fresh air.

The gateway to Downtown at Jefferson and Johnston has two very different options for dining outdoors. **Borden's Ice Cream Shoppe** and **Jefferson Orleans** offers a unique combination of fine dining with prime steaks and seafood and ending the meal with a quick walk across the street to indulge in sundaes made with all the trimmings.

Waking up is always better with a cup of strong coffee and a hearty breakfast. **Dwyer's** patio is a great spot to sit with a newspaper and watch the sunrise, while feasting on omelets, homemade hash browns and all the comforts of a traditional breakfast. Especially on the weekends, the diner is bustling as breakfast sandwiches piled with eggs, bacon and cheese and cajun shrimp omelets are devoured.



outside under straw umbrellas at **Guamas Restaurant and Bar**. One of their specials, the tuna ensalada caribena is a refreshing plate of greens, tomatoes, strings of carrots and green onions with a tuna marinated in a papaya and pineapple sauce and grilled to perfection.

Pamplona Tapas Bar provides an exclusive atmosphere in their outdoor dining. The tables are limited, and the environment on a crisp spring day is superb as familiar faces stop for a chat as they make their way down Jefferson Street. Add one of Pamplona's 40 new menu items and begin to unwind. Start off with bacon wrapped dates for the perfect combination of savory and sweet with a slight crunch. Spice things up with the charred beef carpaccio, which offers thin slices of tender beef served with ponzu, smoked oil Thai chili emulsion, micro greens, and garlic chips.

For a casual atmosphere, **Zeus Café** serves up some of the best Greek and Lebanese fare on the sidewalk of Jefferson Street. Enjoy the light and brisk Chicken

Shawerma salad made with fresh garden vegetables, Greek feta cheese and homemade dressing prepared daily topped off with slices of tender chicken breasts marinated in olive oil, garlic, and spices. They also recommend complementing the salad with one of their domestic or imported wines.

Patio dining on a spring day is not only for your home. **Agave Mexican Grill & Cantina** offers a great view of Parc Sans Souci, while lounging in the sun. With the Lenten season in mind, Fish tacos made with marinated tilapia either grilled or fried, in tortillas with an ancho chipotle mayo, shredded lettuce, pico de gallo, and fresh jalapeños will spice up the experience, while listening to the gentle splash of the Parc Sans Souci fountain.

The Filling Station always has an easygoing and festive outdoor environment with a menu that has something for everyone. Whether it's a day for chips and the creamy, spicy Chile con queso or the much touted prime ribeye, the food is always fresh, and the margaritas are the talk of the town. The Filling Station is the

ideal place to meet and greet familiar and new faces.
