On Stage with the AcA

The highly anticipated, Acadiana Center for the Arts (AcA) Theater is near completion and gearing up for the November grand opening with a series of “tune up” performances in October.

The Billy Jonas Band will be among the first performers with their percussion-based music on October 6th. Also in October, Southern Circuit, a tour of highly talented independent filmmakers, will be showing, and Louisiana Crossroads kicks off their 11th season in the new theater.

These events will offer a glimpse of the versatility of the space, growing into the

Grand Opening events taking place the beginning of November. After a grand Gala opening night, the innovative percussive-dance phenomenon, Rhythmic Circus presents their production of Feet Don't Fail Me Now! Education shows, a Louisiana Crossroads performance, a classical recital and another film screening lead into ArtWalk, highlighting the AcA's ability to integrate visual and performing arts.

The 300 seat theater has multiple staging options and adaptive acoustics, which allow for anything from dance to theater, as well as any type of music

to be presented in an intimate setting. The space is available for daytime activities, special events, film production and as a large recording space. The theater includes a high-definition projection system, high-end sound system and microphone collection.

Completion of the

theatre and its many attributes affords the opportunity for the AcA to further serve the community.

“The Acadiana Center for the Arts has always been an organization with a clear focus on service to our artists, our children and to the community. Upon completion, AcA will serve as a cultural hub, an arts-based community center to the entire region, filled with classes, performances, workshops, exhibitions - filled with creative people of all ages,” said Gerd Wuestemann, Executive Director of AcA.

The ACA was planned and developed as a major cultural destination and anchor to the Downtown Arts District, bringing visual and performing arts and education together in a dynamic, integrated center. It was made possible through significant partnerships with the State of

Children of all ages can try their hand at chalk art during this celebration. Children's activities will take place from 4 p.m.-6 p.m. near Home Bank on Jefferson St. with art, music, refreshments and fun.

Gallery on Vermilion St. The Performing Arts Society of Acadiana (PASA) commemorates Elemore's devotion to drawing. Artists Camille Banucci, Janet Hanchey, Steve Breaux and Kathy Reed will be on hand to mentor even the most novice. Materials provided or bring your own.

Library Finds a Temporary Home

While the main facility on Congress Street undergoes renovations, the Lafayette Public Library Downtown will relocate to its temporary home for collections and



services to 538 Jefferson Street (former Jefferson Street Market). Administrative offices will be housed at 113 Clinton Street. The \$10 million reconstruction of the 63,000-square-foot building includes demolition and rebuilding of interiors, facade and entrance, new and expanded sections and more.

Streetscape Additions Coming

The next phase of the streetscape project will soon get underway, extending street and sidewalk improvements along Jefferson from Lee to Johnston and a Lafayette Street segment. The project is expected to begin mid-September and conclude by early spring 2011.
